Mutualism—this is when two species live together and both benefit from it. Like how bees are pollinators of flowers. The bees get food, and the flowers reproduce because of the bee's visit.



Commensalism—this is when two species live together and one benefits and the other is not harmed. Cattle egrets and cattle have commensalism because the egrets benefit from the stirred up bugs and the cows just do it and don't really gain.



Parasitism—this is when two species live together and one benefits and the other is harmed. This is like when my brother had his tapeworm. The tapeworm lived off my brother's insides and my brother got hurt at the doctors to get it out.

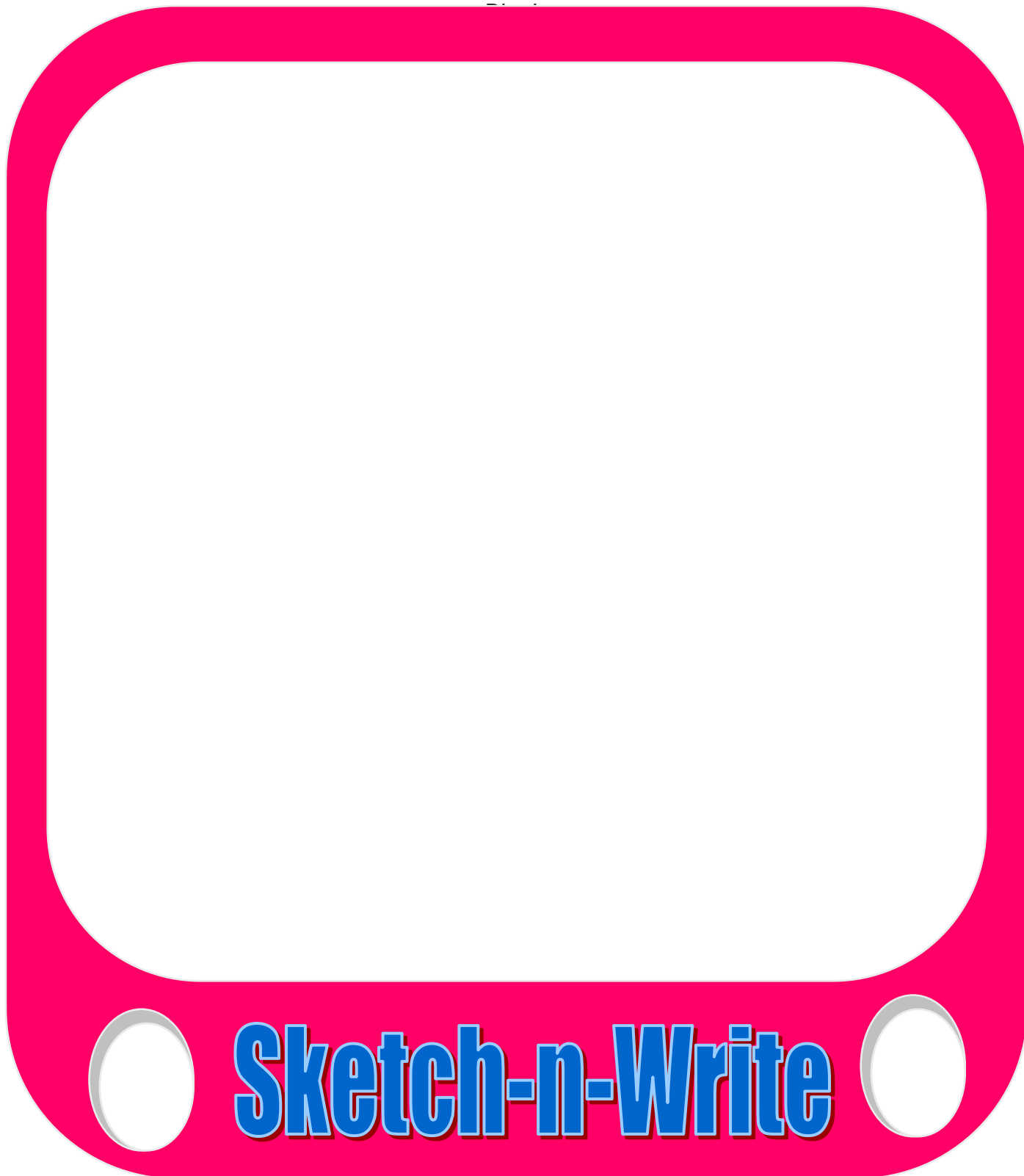
